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Preface

The Administration for Children, Youth and Families (ACYF), located within the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), is pleased to introduce this Fiscal Year 2002 edition of its Compendium of Funded Discretionary Grants.

ACF is responsible for federal programs that promote the economic and social well-being of families, children, individuals, and communities. ACF programs aim to achieve the following:

- families and individuals empowered to increase their own economic independence and productivity;
- strong, healthy, supportive communities that have a positive impact on the quality of life and the development of children;
- partnerships with individuals, front-line service providers, communities, American Indian tribes, Native communities, states, and Congress that enable solutions which transcend traditional agency boundaries;
- services planned, reformed, and integrated to improve needed access; and
- a strong commitment to working with people with developmental disabilities, refugees, and migrants to address their needs, strengths, and abilities.

The grantees included in this Compendium all submitted applications in response to various Discretionary Grant Announcements listed in the *Federal Register*. Each application was reviewed by a panel of experts according to the criteria described in the announcement, and awarded grants from one of the following three bureaus located within ACYF: The Children's Bureau, The Child Care Bureau, and The Family and Youth Services Bureau.





The Children's Bureau

The Children's Bureau (CB) is the oldest federal agency for children and is located within the United States Department of Health and Human Services' Administration for Children and Families, Administration on Children, Youth and Families. It is responsible for assisting States in the delivery of child welfare services - services designed to protect children and strengthen families. With an annual budget of over \$6.7 billion, CB works with State and local agencies to develop a number of programs that focus on preventing the abuse of children in troubled families, protecting children from abuse, and finding permanent placements for those who cannot safely return to their homes. The Children's Bureau seeks to provide for the safety, permanency and well being of children through leadership, support for necessary services, and productive partnerships with States, Tribes and communities. It provides grants to operate a range of child welfare services including child protective services (child abuse and neglect) family preservation and support, foster care, adoption and independent living. In addition, CB makes major investments in staff training, technology and innovative programs.

The Children's Bureau administers eight State grant programs and seven discretionary grant programs. The State grant programs have their own legislatively mandated matching requirements and formulas for allocation and all require that the funds go to and be administered only by the State child welfare agency or, in some programs, Indian Tribes or Tribal organizations. The State agency can have agreements and contracts with other public agencies and with private agencies for provision of appropriate services. In the discretionary programs, the Administration for Children and Families policy requires a match from the grantees for all discretionary grant projects other than research.



The Children's Bureau's Discretionary Grant Programs

Adoption Opportunities

The Adoption Opportunities program eliminates barriers to adoption and helps to find permanent families for children who would benefit by adoption, particularly children with special needs. The seven major program areas, as mandated by the legislation, are: (1) the development and implementation of a national adoption and foster care data gathering and analysis system; (2) the development and implementation of a national adoption information exchange system; (3) the development and implementation of an adoption training and technical assistance program; (4) increasing the placements in adoptive families of minority children who are in foster care and have the goal of adoption with a special emphasis on recruitment of minority families; and (5) post-legal adoption services for families who have adopted children with special needs; (6) study the nature, scope, and effects of placement of children in kinship care arrangements, pre-adoptive, or adoptive homes; and (7) study the efficacy of States contracting with public and private nonprofit agencies (including community-based and other organizations).

Abandoned Infants Assistance

The Abandoned Infants Assistance program is intended for development, implementation and operation of projects to demonstrate how to (1) prevent abandonment; (2) identify and address needs of abandoned infants, especially those with AIDS; (3) assist these children to reside with their biological families if possible, or in foster care; (4) recruit, train and retain foster parents; (5) carry out residential care programs for abandoned children and children with AIDS; (6) establish programs of respite care for families and foster families; (7) recruit and train health and social services personnel to work with families, foster families and residential care staff. Grants are made to public and nonprofit private entities.

**Child Abuse and Neglect: Community-Based Family
Resource and Support Program (CAPTA)**

Since 1974, the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) [USC 5105] has funded discretionary research, evaluation and assistance activities designed to provide information needed to better protect children from abuse or neglect and to improve the well-being of abused or neglected children.

Title II of CAPTA, the Community-Based Family Resource and Support Grants program, specifically supports State efforts to develop, operate, expand and enhance a network of community-based, prevention-focused, family resource and support programs that coordinate resources among existing education, vocational rehabilitation, disability, respite care, health, mental health, job readiness, self-sufficiency, child and family development, community action, Head Start, child care, child abuse and neglect prevention, juvenile justice, domestic violence prevention and intervention, housing, and other human service organizations within the State and to foster an understanding, appreciation, and knowledge of diverse populations in order to be effective in preventing and treating child abuse and neglect.

Loving Homes, Inc., of Denver, Colorado, will increase the adoptive placement of Hispanic children by emphasizing the recruitment, retention, and utilization of Hispanic adoptive families. The plan targets permanent resources for Hispanic children who are over the age of ten or part of a sibling group. The approach centers on: 1) utilization of mentorship as a bridge to permanency, 2) community-based recruitment, and 3) training and technical assistance to help with retention of resources developed. Results and benefits will include the adoptive placement of waiting Hispanic children and the ongoing capacity to recruit and retain resources at the community level. The mentorship program is seen as a strong method for institutionalizing positive change in terms of locating adult connections for waiting children. Evaluation of the project will focus on qualitative analysis of the mentor experience as well as quantitative results in terms of the number of placements achieved.

The State of Louisiana, Department of Social Services, Office of Community Services will increase respite care resources for foster/adoptive families by establishing a Respite Care project in the 10 Foster/Adoptive Family Resource Centers in the state. A minimum of 30 families and 50 children will receive respite care services through each center each year, with a total of 300 families and 1500 children for the three-year period. Each region will develop services providing emergency and crisis, recreational, and maintenance respite. Resources will include local respite providers, certified foster/adoptive families, faith-based organizations, community service agencies, and kinship providers. Centers will send a contingent of teens to a summer camp hosted by one of the state universities or a site determined and facilitated by the Louisiana Network of Family Resource Centers. A comprehensive evaluative research design will provide output and outcome measures.

Project Inclusion will use a model intervention piloted by the Center For Family Connections (CFFC). At the core is a high-interest magazine/production project that promotes expression and sharing among peers. During the three-year project period, CFFC will build partnerships for model implementation; evaluate, refine, and document the model; and replicate it through training, dissemination, and support of new projects across New England and in other states. The project will be a partnership between CFFC and Adoption and Foster Care (AFC) Mentoring. AFC Mentoring has run mentor training, peer support, and empowerment groups in conjunction with CFFC. Coordinators/2, Inc., a private, non-profit, licensed child placement agency, will develop the Pathways to Healing Project, a post-legal adoption model of assessment and treatment of attachment and trauma issues that utilizes the most current body of knowledge regarding the relationship between neurobiological and psychological functioning. The project will create a paradigm shift from crisis oriented, post-legal adoption services to a client driven, holistic, therapeutic intervention, which combines both neurological and psychological strategies. The project will develop an assessment and treatment protocol that provides services to 100 children and will provide training, through a statewide conference, to professionals, staff, and parents. The knowledge gained will be disseminated through conferences, articles, statewide training and the Statewide Post Legal Adoption Network. DePelchin Children's Center's Creating Adoption Neighborhoods will focus on a small, rural town in Texas in which families adopted almost 70 children in the last five years. The 3-year project will create five predominantly African-American neighborhoods in which adoption becomes a norm, so as to increase the placement of African American children, especially those who are part of a sibling group. The project will analyze each neighborhood in Harris County, Texas to identify existing communication and social support venues. Social marketing focus groups will identify adoption messages to promote and influence a neighborhood as an adoption neighborhood. There will be 360 children placed. Process monitoring will track the implementation of project activities, components of the media campaign, number of recruitment activities, and number of families/individuals participating at each step of the adoption process. Outcome evaluation will assess residents' perception of their neighborhood and adoptive families' perceptions of the supportiveness of their neighborhood.

The Adoption Preservation Program (APP) of Family Resources, Inc. will provide post-legal adoption preservation services. APP will determine the factors associated with the severity of adoptive child and family problems, analyze the nature of emotional and behavioral problems of adopted children served by APP via quantitative and qualitative data, examine the connection between child behavior problems and the dynamics of specific adoption issues (e.g. grief/trauma), and disseminate project results and benefits through a Final Report and state/public forums. Services of APP will include individual and family counseling, support groups, resource development, respite care, cash assistance, and crisis intervention. Bienvenidos Children's Center, Inc. will provide respite care services for 150 adoptive families and 300 adopted children residing in Los Angeles County per year. Priority will be given to families with emergency situations, children with severe emotional or behavioral problems, and families with situations that might lead to disruption. Goals are to maintain adoptive placements for 150 participating adoptive families; to reduce stress for adoptive families using respite services; and to reduce potential for abuse, neglect, or placement in foster care for participating children. Each family may receive up to 30 days of planned or emergency respite per year. Options include: 24-hour respite care for children up to age 8 at Bienvenidos' 24-hour crisis respite center; 24-hour respite in the family's home delivered by a Respite Worker or Natural Helper; day respite at the family's home or Bienvenidos; recreational respite; and assessment, referral to other services, and follow-up contacts.

Family Support Services of the Bay Area will refer pre- and post-finalized adoptive families who have children with special needs. The project's services will provide respite to a minimum of 50 families and will develop parent trainings on how to recruit, screen, and supervise their own provider. The program will operate two respite systems: a direct parent payment system and an agency sponsored system of in-home, out-of-home, and site-based care. These simultaneous service systems will not only provide various service options to families, but will also provide opportunities to evaluate parent preference and compare the benefits, limitations, and impact of various respite service models. Family Support Services will improve family functioning and efficacy in locating and screening their own providers reduce stress and will reduce the rate of disruption and parental burden. It is anticipated that this service will contribute towards recruitment and retention of adoptive placements.

The Adoption Exchange Association will develop The Collaboration to AdoptUSKids. The Association will operate and maintain the National Adoption Information Exchange System and the National Adoption Internet Photolisting Website, as well as a training and technical assistance program. The Association will address: a) the provision of training and technical assistance to build the recruitment capacity of States, Tribes, and regions; b) the implementation of a bold special needs foster and adoptive parent recruitment campaign; c) the creation of a support network of adoptee, adoptive parent, and sibling groups to help adoptive families thrive; d) the facilitation of communication and collaboration between agencies to increase inter-jurisdictional placements; and e) the completion of research to identify barriers to, and factors that enhance, completion of the adoption process. Healthy Families Alaska (HFAK), a child abuse prevention/intervention program, is designed to provide support services to expectant parents and parents of newborns. Currently there are seven Healthy Families Alaska sites providing services to 366 families. Healthy Families will: (1) extend Healthy Families Alaska program services to a greater number of families; (2) provide training, program development, and technical support to HFAK program staff so they may enhance the ability of parents to protect, nurture, and support the development of their children and reduce risk factors and barriers to effective parenting; (3) provide clinical consultation to Healthy Families Alaska programs in the areas of mental health, domestic violence, and substance abuse treatment services; and (4) revise, publish, and distribute a prenatal and newborn (through the first year of life) health diary.





The Child Care Bureau

The Child Care Bureau is dedicated to enhancing the quality, affordability, and availability of child care for all families. The Child Care Bureau administers federal funds to states, territories, and tribes to assist low-income families in accessing quality child care for children when the parents work or participate in education or training.

Organizationally, CCB is located within the Administration on Children, Youth and Families, which is part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Administration for Children and Families. At the time of its founding in 1995, the Federal Register identified the activities of the Bureau as including:

- Advising the Associate Commissioner of the Administration on Children, Youth and Families on issues regarding child care programs;
- Developing legislative, regulatory and budgetary proposals;
- Presenting operational planning objectives and initiatives related to child care to the Office of the Associate Commissioner;
- Providing leadership and coordination for child care within the Administration for Children and Families; and
- Establishing linkages with other agencies on child care issues, including agencies within DHHS, relevant agencies across the federal, state, local governments, tribal governments, and non-government organizations at the federal, state, and local levels.

With the passage of the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 (Welfare Reform Act) came responsibility for implementing the Child Care and Development Block Grant. The Department recognized that child care was key to the success of Welfare Reform. In former Secretary Shalala's words, "Affordable, accessible and quality child care is critical to help move families from welfare to work." The Child Care Bureau moved quickly to set program rules and distribute block-grant funds to grantees. The CCB's rapid implementation of this new consolidated program earned the Bureau former Vice President Gore's "Hammer Award." This early success was followed by many other accomplishments, which were celebrated at the Bureau's fifth anniversary celebration in 2000.



The Child Care Bureau's Discretionary Grant Programs

The Early Learning Opportunities Act

The Early Learning Opportunities Act (ELOA) was passed by Congress to award grants to States to enable them to increase, support, expand and better coordinate early learning opportunities for children and their families through local community organizations. The purposes of the Act are to: (1) Increase the availability of voluntary programs, services, and activities that support early childhood development, increase parent effectiveness, and promote the learning readiness of young children so that they enter school ready to learn; (2) support parents, child care providers, and caregivers who want to incorporate early learning activities into the daily lives of young children; (3) remove barriers to the provision of an accessible system of early childhood learning programs in communities throughout the United States; (4) increase the availability and affordability of professional development activities and compensation for caregivers and child care providers; and (5) facilitate the development of community-based systems of collaborative service delivery models characterized by resource sharing, linkages between appropriate supports, and local planning for services.

In FY 2002, each of the grantees will promote enhancing early childhood literacy as a part of their project. Examples of their implementation strategies include: promoting effective parenting; providing education and training for parents, providers, and caregivers to facilitate child development; promoting learning readiness; and developing better linkages among service providers within local communities. Several grantees plan to establish better connections between health and child care programs to expand the availability of care for special populations including infants and toddlers, children with special needs, and families that require non-standard hour care. Many grantees will work to improve quality child care through recruitment and retention incentives, and increased compensation for providers. The project period for all FY 2002 ELOA grants is September 30, 2002 through February 28, 2004 (17 months).



The Child Care Bureau's Discretionary Grant Programs

Child Care Research and Evaluation

Child care research and evaluation are critical to understanding child care and its implications for children and families. Under Federal legislation governing welfare and child care, States have the opportunity to craft programs suited to their citizens; however, they are also faced with unprecedented challenges in meeting the needs of low-income, under-served, and other vulnerable populations. Public agencies are increasingly under pressure to use their child care dollars as effectively as possible and to demonstrate how their investments are making a difference in the lives of families with children. Research and analysis of administrative data need to be expanded and updated in order to address policy and planning issues.

A significant amount of child care research is currently being conducted with support from the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), and other funding agencies. In 1995, the CCB initiated a series of cooperative agreements for Child Care Policy Research Partnerships. These partnerships, composed of policy makers, practitioners, and researchers, are providing State and cross-State information on child care needs, utilization patterns and outcomes for low-income families. They have contributed information on the effects of State and local policies on (1) parents' choice of care; (2) the supply of care; (3) the duration of subsidy utilization and child care arrangements; and (4) the relationship between availability of subsidized care and entry into the job market. Twenty-two States have participated in these research collaborations.

The Child Care Bureau's research agenda supports activities that have the potential to provide information and data to guide child care services, inform policy debates, and assist in developing solutions to complex child care issues. We intend to improve our capacity to respond to questions of immediate concern to policy makers, strengthen the child care research infrastructure, and increase knowledge. We are particularly concerned about the efficacy of child care policies and programs in providing positive outcomes for children and helping low-income families obtain and retain work.



The Child Care Bureau's Discretionary Grant Programs

The Bureau's research agenda is broadly construed, with projects engaged in a wide variety of studies related to the following sets of issues:

- The child care needs, decision-making processes, utilization patterns, and outcomes for low-income families, including welfare recipients, those moving from welfare to work, and the working poor;
- The child care opportunities and constraints which affect low-income families and children under differing child care policies, changing State and local child care systems, and emerging market conditions;
- Child care quality, costs and outcomes, particularly for low-income children and families;
- Population variations and their implications for child care demand, supply, and outcomes;
- State child care policy variations and their effects.

This request from the Miami-Dade School Readiness Coalition is to implement the Early Authors Program (EAP), an intervention designed to impact literacy by engaging children from birth to age 5, including children with special needs, their families, and caregivers in Miami-Dade County, in authoring books. Miami-Dade County is located in southeastern Florida. Miami-Dade County's 2.2 million individuals representing approximately 13% of Florida's population (U.S. Census Bureau, 2000) have a median household income \$29,000 and over 150,000 children under five years of age. For this program, the 32 sites and 112 caregivers (center-based, family child) will be selected from the four quadrants of the county and represent the diverse socio-economic and ethnic groups that make up Miami-Dade County. The intervention includes: Heads Up! Reading, a bilingual, video-based course for caregivers and providers; on-site, follow-up technical assistance for caregivers by literacy specialists; Transformative Family Literacy Program (TFLP, Ada 1988), 24-weeks of children and families creating their own books based on their actions and cultural identity; and parent and family involvement in the form of parent workshops and home visits. The multi-method evaluation strategy incorporates quantitative and qualitative data to determine the effectiveness of the program on: children's early learning; caregivers/providers' ability to produce enhanced literacy outcomes for young children; families' use of literacy strategies in their homes and communities; and systems of collaborative service delivery resource sharing. EAP will impact approximately 112 caregivers, 1,024 children, and over 800 families. The culturally-rich materials developed by the children and families during the project will be disseminated to other child care sites to help strengthen the recognition and validity of our multiethnic environment.

The Maine Department of Human Services is at a critical point in the development of a strategic plan for childcare services. This dissertation study by the RAND Corporation will examine the impact of kindergarten entrance age policies on the childcare needs of families. A rise in the minimum entrance age for kindergarten would force some children to enter school a year later. These children will need childcare for the additional time out of school, which may impose additional childcare costs on their families. In particular, this research will address three issues. First, how many children will be forced to enter kindergarten later due to an increase in the minimum entrance age? Second, which children will be affected by these changes are certain disadvantaged sub-population more likely to be affected? Finally, what is the additional burden of childcare costs on the families of children affected by entrance age policies? I propose to model parents' entrance age decisions as a function of social and economic factors, such as household composition, demographics, wages and price of childcare. The parameters of this model will be estimated by using data from the Early Childhood Longitudinal Study (ECLS-K)—a nationally representative cohort of kindergartners enrolled during the school year 1998-99. The estimated parameters will be used to simulate the effect of various changes in kindergarten cutoff dates. This research will guide state policy makers in designing better entrance age and childcare policies that will take into account the impact of entrance age policies on the childcare needs of children that are forced to stay out of school for additional time. By identifying characteristics of these children it will also help to better target early childhood programs.

In the second phase, using three waves of longitudinal data on about 900 families, I will explore how employed mothers balance their work and family roles, and how the quality of their children's child care moderates that process. In both phases of research, using data collected by the NICHD Study of Early Child Care, I will fit individual growth models to investigate how maternal responsiveness, employment, work/family attitudes, child care, and the relationships among them change during children's first three years of life. Growth models are used to estimate trajectories of change (or growth rates) that describe how individuals change over time and estimate how rates of change vary as a function of substantive predictors. My research will provide information that will be useful to researchers, policy-makers, and program developers interested in maternal employment, early childhood development, and child care because it will provide insight into how family dynamics are affected by mothers' work, and how child care can play a role. In addition, it will provide information about how childcare programs can support healthy family functioning as families negotiate changes brought about by maternal employment.

The main focus of the Baylor University project is to develop a professional development training program for childcare providers that will improve developmental outcomes for the children in their care. Furthermore, this project focuses on making these changes in less than quality settings where deprivation exerts its most negative effects. The training is designed to produce the largest developmental outcomes for children age 18 to 24 months with a minimal amount of expense and time. The approach is based upon what is known in the research regarding joint attention and language development, as well as best practices for early childhood education and professional development training. In order to demonstrate the effectiveness of this approach, the study will be conducted in “less than quality” childcare centers. This project is a dissertation study investigating the effects of the simple, dynamic, researched-based professional development training for childcare staff on the language development of young children. The study is being conducted in childcare centers in Central Texas. The study is designed to experimentally compare the effects of the training on a randomly assigned group of “less than quality” childcare centers to those of a control group of like childcare centers. It is hypothesized that the young children in the classes of trained providers will demonstrate better language acquisition than those in the control group classes.

The Wisconsin Child Care Data Sharing Project will establish a state-wide research infrastructure to strengthen analysis, interpretation, and sharing of critical administrative child care data from multiple state sources. To meet the nation's objective of promoting early learning and development we must improve the professional skills and knowledge of the adults who are paid to care for young children. Federal and state policy leaders therefore need accurate information about the size of the child care workforce, the distribution of this workforce among various child care settings (centers, family child care, paid relatives), and the ages of the children in care. The Human Services Policy Center will apply the national workforce estimation methodology we have developed to provide estimates for selected states, and test the validity of our estimates against the best available state-collected workforce data. Assuming verification, this effort will enable us to have the capacity to produce workforce estimates for each of the 50 states and, potentially, for sub-state regions. In selected states, we will generate estimates of the size and components of the child care workforce for children from birth through 5 years old. We will test the validity of our approaches by comparing our estimates to the most reliable workforce data available in those states. Major products will include (a) estimates of the size and components of the birth through 5 child care workforce for 6 to 10 states; (b) an analysis of how our workforce estimates compare to state- and federally-collected data on components of the childcare workforce; and (c) an annotated catalogue of workforce data that each state currently collects.

This three-year applied research project will help build a new policy framework for child care that addresses the sector's importance from an economic development perspective. First we will explore how input/output modeling can be adapted to model the economic development impacts of the child care industry. Problems with counting the employment and out output of an industry that involves such a diverse mix of public, private and non-profit providers will be addressed. We will explore how and why the economic impacts of child care differ across place-from rural to urban localities, and across states. Borrowing from methodologies used in the physical infrastructure arena. We will explore how to value the infrastructural role played by child care in enabling parents to go to work. This research should help contribute to a better theoretical and empirical understanding of how care work contributes to the broader economy. The second component of this project will focus on dissemination. We will develop and test a web-based methodology that can be used by states and localities to measure the economic impact of the child care industry in their region. This tool will enable users to collectively build database (using their state and local administrative data) and begin to shape a national picture of the early care and education industry as a whole. The third component of this project will be to monitor how stated and cities us an economic development frame to craft new approaches to child care finance and administration. Despite the critical role the Child Care subsidy plays we, know almost nothing about the child care providers upon whom the subsidy system depends. In other areas of social policy, such as education and health, provider studies are common. In comparison, we know very little about such issues as which child care providers do or do not participate in the subsidy system, providers' basic characteristics, and the quality of care they provide. We also know little about the relationship between different subsidy policies and practices and the willingness and ability of child care providers to serve subsidized children. Our current inability to answer even these most basic questions leaves child care administrators and policymakers struggling to implement subsidy programs in an information vacuum. It also seriously challenges our ability to ensure that we are using our existing resources effectively to better support families and children. This study will look at three important policy questions. In particular: 1). What are the characteristics of child care providers, and do they differ by subsidy status? 2). What are the characteristic of the subsidy program, policies, and implementation, and how do they affect providers? 3). What is the interplay between subsidy policies and practices, how they affect providers, and who participates in the subsidy system?

That approach suggests that the best way to prevent young people's involvement in risky behavior is to help them achieve their full potential. Youth development strategies, therefore, focus on giving young people the chance to exercise leadership, build skills, and become involved in their communities. The Positive Youth Development approach also acknowledges that helping young people requires strengthening families and communities.

FYSB supports communities in implementing a Positive Youth Development approach to helping young people and their families. Through its Research and Demonstration Program, for example, FYSB is funding 13 States to develop and support innovative youth development strategies. In addition, FYSB promotes Positive Youth Development through its three grant programs, described on the next page.

The Bureau has also created a network of support that includes a national hotline and referral system for runaway and homeless youth; offers conferences, trainings, and onsite consultations; documents effective practices; and distributes information.

Basic Center Program

In the early 1970s, national attention focused on runaway and homeless youth. There was widespread concern about youth who were away from home and in at-risk situations, usually through no fault of their own. Few community services existed that provided them with shelter or helped to reunite them with their families.

At the same time, efforts to help these young people were beginning at the local level. Local youth service professionals had begun building a system of care for youth who had run away from home, and they recommended changes in the way those young people were being handled by existing social service systems. Concurrently, there was recognition at the Federal level that youth committing “status offenses” (behaviors considered offenses only if carried out by a minor, such as truancy or running away) needed supervision, care, and guidance rather than punishment.

Those forces came together during congressional hearings on help for runaway youth in January 1972. The hearings began a process that resulted in congressional passage, 2½ years later, of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act (JJDPA) of 1974 (Public Law 93-415). The JJDPA created a system of financial support for States that was linked to several mandates designed to improve community treatment of young people in at-risk circumstances. To receive Federal JJDPA funding, for example, States had to agree to deinstitutionalize status offenders, including runaway youth.

To support deinstitutionalization efforts, Congress authorized the Basic Center Program through the JJDPA's Runaway and Homeless Youth Act (RHYA). The Basic Center Program would provide a system of care for young runaways outside the traditional child protective services, law enforcement, or juvenile justice agencies. Congress assigned administration of the Basic Center Program to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). The HHS' Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB) began funding local communities to operate Basic Centers in 1974.

Basic Center Program, continued

Today, the Basic Center Program is part of FYSB's Runaway and Homeless Youth Program and is authorized by the RHYA, as amended by the Missing, Exploited, and Runaway Children Protection Act (Public Law 106-71). Through the Basic Center Program, FYSB provides financial assistance to establish or strengthen community-based programs that address the immediate needs of runaway and homeless youth and their families. The central purpose of these programs is to provide youth with emergency shelter, food, clothing, counseling, and referrals for health care. The Basic Centers seek to reunite young people with their families, whenever possible, or to locate appropriate alternative placements.

FYSB encourages its grantee programs to support young people through a youth development approach once their primary needs have been addressed. That approach suggests that the best way to prevent young people's involvement in risky behavior is to help them achieve their full potential. Youth development strategies, therefore, focus on giving young people the chance to exercise leadership, build skills, and become involved in their communities.

While each Basic Center is slightly different, all Basic Centers are required to offer the following types of assistance to young people and their families:

- Food, clothing, medical care, or other services that youth need (offered either directly or by referral)
- Individual, group, and family counseling
- Recreation programs
- Outreach targeting both youth who may need assistance and other public or private agencies that work with youth and families
- Aftercare services for youth after they leave the shelter

Transitional Living Program for Older Homeless Youth

Thousands of young people run away from their homes, are asked to leave their homes, or become homeless in the United States each year. Since 1975, under the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974 (JJDPA), as amended, the Federal Government has funded emergency shelter programs for runaway and homeless youth that provide for the immediate needs of these youth and their families and promote family reunification. Unfortunately, however, many young people who are homeless today cannot return to their families. Some have escaped abusive situations; others are the victims of neglect, abandonment, or severe family conflict.

In response to the growing concern for these youth, Congress determined that many young people need long-term, supportive assistance that emergency shelter programs were not designed to provide. As a result, Congress created the Transitional Living Program for Older Homeless Youth (TLP) as part of the 1988 Amendments to the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act (RHYA), Title III of the JJDPA. The TLP was modeled after several successful demonstration projects funded in the early 1980s by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). Congress assigned administration of the TLP to the HHS. The HHS' Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB) funded the first TLP projects in 1990.

Today, the Transitional Living Program is part of FYSB's Runaway and Homeless Youth Program and is authorized by the RHYA, as amended by the Missing, Exploited, and Runaway Children Protection Act (Public Law 106-71). Through the TLP, FYSB supports projects that provide longer term residential services to homeless youth ages 16–21 for up to 18 months. These services are designed to help youth who are homeless make a successful transition to self-sufficient living. TLP grantees are required to provide youth with stable, safe living accommodations and services that help them develop the skills necessary to move to independence. Living accommodations may be host family homes, group homes, or "supervised apartments." (Supervised apartments are either agency-owned apartment buildings or "scattered site" apartments, which are single-occupancy apartments rented directly by young people with support from the agency.)

In addition, FYSB encourages its grantee programs to support young people through a Positive Youth Development approach. That approach suggests that the best way to prevent young people's involvement in risky behavior is to help them achieve their full potential. Youth development strategies, therefore, focus on giving young people the chance to exercise leadership, build skills, and become involved in their communities.

TLP grantees are required to offer the following services, either directly or by referral:

- Safe, stable living accommodations
- Basic life-skill building, including consumer education and instruction in budgeting, using credit, housekeeping, menu planning, and food preparation
- Interpersonal skill building, including enhancing young people's abilities to establish positive relationships with peers and adults, make decisions, and manage stress
- Educational opportunities, such as GED preparation, postsecondary training, or vocational education
- Assistance in job preparation and attainment, such as career counseling and job placement
- Education, information, and counseling to prevent, treat, and reduce substance abuse
- Mental health care, including individual and group counseling
- Physical health care, including routine physicals, health assessments, and emergency treatment

Street Outreach Program

Today, in communities across the country, there are young people living on the streets, running from or being asked to leave homes characterized by abuse, neglect, or parental drug or alcohol abuse. Once on the streets, such youth are at risk of being sexually exploited or abused by adults for pleasure or profit.

To prevent the sexual abuse or exploitation of these young people by providing them with services that help them leave the streets, Congress established the Education and Prevention Services to Reduce Sexual Abuse of Runaway, Homeless, and Street Youth Program, through the Violence Against Women Act of the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 (Public Law 103-322). That program created Grants for the Prevention of Sexual Abuse and Exploitation (also known as the Street Outreach Program) to fund street-based outreach and education for runaway and homeless youth and youth on the streets who have been, or are at risk of being, sexually abused and exploited.

Congress assigned administration of the Street Outreach Program to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). Since 1996, the HHS' Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB) has funded communities to operate projects through the Street Outreach Program. Today, the program is authorized by the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act, Title III of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974, as amended by the Missing, Exploited, and Runaway Children Protection Act (Public Law 106-71).

The Street Outreach Program is part of FYSB's Runaway and Homeless Youth Program. Through the program, FYSB awards grants to private, nonprofit agencies to conduct outreach designed to build relationships between grantee staff and street youth. The goal of these efforts is to help young people leave the streets. The local grantees provide a range of services directly or through collaboration with other agencies, specifically those working to protect and treat young people who have been, or who are at risk of being, subjected to sexual abuse or exploitation. These services include the following:

The Harris County Children's Protective Services Community Youth Services (CYS) Safety Net Program will provide crisis assessment and intervention to at least 350 youth who are, or are at risk of, running away and/or becoming homeless. If youth need out-of-home short-term shelter, CYC will provide 225 days of host family shelter in or near the youth's community (or other emergency shelters more suitable for their needs). Youth continue attending school and remain connected to their support systems while the entire family works toward a safe return or alternative placement. Case management, resource information and referrals, community-based family therapy for 350 families, and psychological assessments for 60 youth will be provided to Safety Net Program clients. The girls' shelter provides services to girls, aged 12-17 years. The boys' 12-bed shelter provides services to boys, aged 12-17 years. Case managers and residential counselors focus on helping these youth feel safe and comfortable as they work to resolve the issues that caused them to run from conflicts at home. Objectives are to provide treatment, counseling, information, and referral services, with immediate access to Seton House shelters. The need is critical for these youth who are vulnerable while living on the streets and have multiple family issues that they have left behind. During 2001, Seton House provided shelter to 170 girls and 89 boys. Seton House will shelter a projected 200 girls and 100 boys in the coming year and will offer individual, group, and family counseling designed to help them resolve conflicts and return home. During 2000, 90 percent of clients were successfully reunited with their families.

(TLC) in Johnson County, KS, provides temporary housing to runaway and homeless youth who need a safe place to stay while awaiting their safe return home or another placement. These youth, often victims of abuse or neglect, come to TLC broken in spirit and sometimes physically battered. TLC has a successful history of working with such youth and offers an array of alternatives to young people who are on the run or the street. Youth crisis counselors are available 24 hours a day to provide home-based crisis counseling in an effort to immediately reunite youth with their families (or prevent them from being pushed out). If the youth needs a safe place to go, shelter is available for up to 15 days. This multilevel approach has proven effective in successfully impacting the lives of runaway and homeless youth for the past 12 years. In 2000-2001, 90 percent of the runaway and homeless youth provided shelter had a positive discharge, and 88 percent of the youth provided with home-based counseling were reunited with their families. TLC plans to provide 100 youth with home-based counseling for up to 3 months and another 100 youth with temporary housing.
