

Michigan ARP Child Care Stabilization Fact Sheet

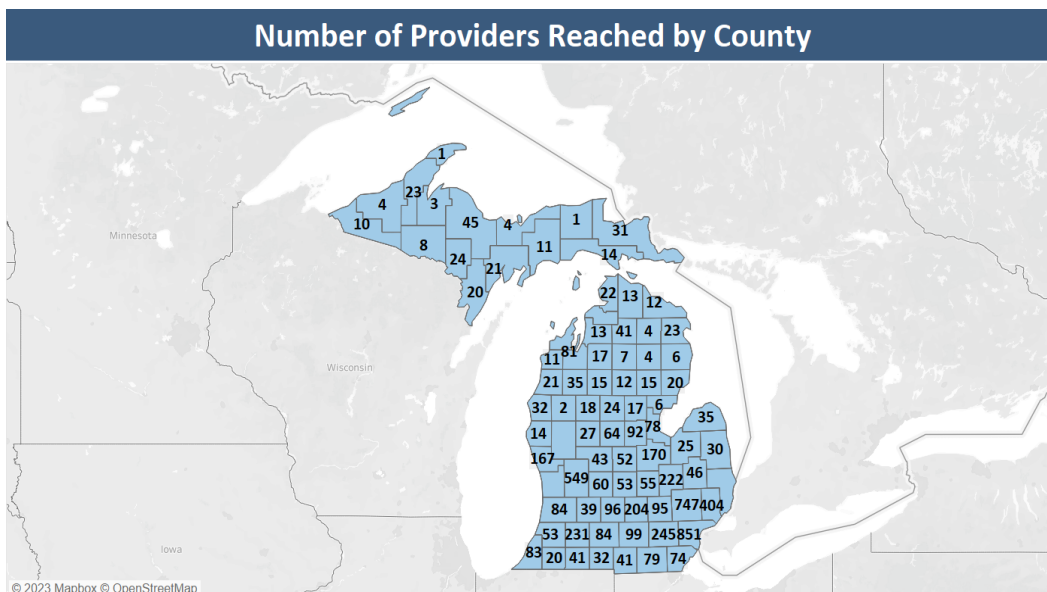
6,465 Child Care Programs in Michigan have Received American Rescue Plan Stabilization Support, Impacting up to 290,500 Children

ARP's historic investment provided Michigan with \$700.7 million for their Child Care Stabilization program. The program has been critical to helping child care centers and family child care providers nationwide remain open or reopen, keeping child care workers on the payroll, and ensuring families have reliable options for high quality care while they work. Child care programs are mostly small businesses and are essential for families, communities, and the economy.

The ARP Child Care Stabilization program has been an unprecedented lifeline for the child care sector that helped parents return to work and spurred economic recovery. So far, more than 220,000 child care programs serving as many as 9.6 million children have received assistance across the country from this program.

In Michigan:

- Providers in 100% of Michigan counties have received funds.
- 3,175 child care centers that received stabilization payments most commonly used them to pay for personnel costs and keep programs staffed.
- 3,290 child care family homes that received stabilization payments most commonly used them to pay for rent and mortgage payments, typically their largest operating expense.
- On average, child care centers have received an award of \$271,300 and family homes have received \$37,900.
