## Oregon's Early Learning Council

- 2010 Governor Kitzhaber elected with health and education reform agenda
  - Governor's Vision By 2025:
    - 40% of Oregonians will have earned a bachelor's degree or higher
    - 40% of Oregonians will have earned an associate's degree or post-secondary credential
    - 20% of Oregonians will have earned a high school diploma or it's equivalent

#### Vision and Focus

- 2011 at urging of Governor, Oregon Legislature created Early Learning Council
  - Serves as State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care
  - Created as a part of birth to 20 education reform
    - Children Ready for kindergarten
    - Children are raised in stable & attached families
    - Integrated Systems

### Results to Highlight

- Kindergarten Readiness Assessment
  - Pilot 2012, Statewide rollout in fall 2013
  - Dept. of Education State Board administrative rules
  - Embedding into k-12 assessment system
- Tiered Quality Rating and Improvement System
  - Culmination of quality improvement initiatives for all early learning and development programs
  - Field study of 250 programs in 2013, statewide rollout 2014

### Results to Highlight

#### Legislation

- o HB 4165:

  - Combined HS Advisory Board with governing ELC
  - ➤ Develop a design for community-based coordinators of early learning services – identify functions, criteria of an RFP, report to legislature in 2013

### Results to Highlight

- Hubs: Community-Based Coordinators of Early Learning Services
  - Implementing our vision by integrating and bringing child services together for communities across the state.
  - Connecting health, child services, and data systems.
  - Ensuring services across the state are accountable for the future of Oregon children.

### Proposed 2013 Legislation

- Create an Early Learning Division Governance and integration of state service delivery
- Community-based coordinators of early learning services:
  - Communities will work together to define a geographic region of early learning services and apply via RFA
  - Create strategies to improve outcomes, reduce duplication, increase coordination so that children are ready for kindergarten
  - All state funded services coordinate for outcomes through analysis of a comprehensive children's budget
