FACES Study Design

- Descriptive study of Head Start children, families and programs
- Regular periodicity: new cohort every 3 years (1997, 2000, 2003, 2006, 2009)
- Nationally representative samples of 3- and 4-year-old children entering Head Start for the first time*
- Longitudinal design: interviews, child assessments, and teacher-child reports at fall program entry, spring of 1 or 2 program years, spring kindergarten follow-up
- *Note: The FACES sample does not include children served in Migrant/Seasonal or American Indian/Alaska Native programs, or programs in Puerto Rico or U.S. Territories

FACES is a Periodic Source of Data on:

- Child & Family Demographics, Parenting, and the Home Environment
 - Child age, gender, race/ethnicity
 - Home language
 - Parent education, employment, household income
 - Parenting approaches, learning activities with children
 - Health, mental health, health care, and nutrition
 - Involvement w/ Head Start, satisfaction w/ Head Start
- Child Outcomes
 - Cognitive development
 - Social-emotional development
 - Height and weight (new in FACES 2006)
- Teachers & Classrooms
 - Teacher demographics, education, experience
 - Classroom environment (activities, curricula)
 - Observations of classroom quality

FACES 2006 Provides a National Picture

Nationally representative sample of:

- 60 programs
- 135 centers
- 410 classrooms
- 3,315 children (in fall 2006) and their parents and classroom teachers


Key Questions and Topics for Today

- Who is Head Start serving?
- What are children's school readiness skills at entry and what progress do they make in Head Start and beyond?
- What is their physical health and disability status?
- How engaged and satisfied are parents?
- How well-credentialed and supported are Head Start teachers?
- What is the quality of the classroom environment?

Who is Head Start Serving Now?

- Head Start is serving more Latino children and Dual Language Learners (DLLs)
 - FACES 2000: 28% Latino, 18% DLLs
 - FACES 2003 (31% and 20%)
 - FACES 2006 (35% and 27%)
- Head Start is serving a larger proportion of 3-year-olds
 - In fall 2006, 63% of <u>new entrants</u> in Head Start were 3-year-olds (According to PIR, 3-year-olds account for 40% of the <u>total</u> population served by Head Start)
 - Among 3-year-olds newly entering in fall 2006, 88% completed at least 1 year of Head Start, but only 58% completed 2 years of Head Start

Head Start Serves A Diverse Group of Children








Parents of Dual Language Learners Have Varied Language Abilities


Children's School Readiness Skills and Developmental Status

Children Show Diverse Skills at Program Entry





Children Show Growth in School Readiness Skills





Children Show Growth in Social Skills






Most Children with a Disability Have a Speech or Language Impairment



Latino Parents Increase Reading to Child During Head Start Year






Parents are "Very Satisfied" with Head Start Services


Classroom Environment

Teacher AA Degrees Increase Over Time





Most Teachers Have a Mentor Who Visits Their Classroom Regularly





ECERS-R Total Scores are in Adequate Range





- Head Start children enter with skills below national norms and make progress during and after the program
- Vocabulary and early math skills lag behind letter knowledge and early writing, on average
- Parents are engaged and satisfied with program services
- Classroom quality measures of intentional instruction demonstrate room for improvement
