Human Developmental Researchers are playing a LARGE role in change

Began with the groundbreaking work of Ed Ziegler, McViker Hunt, Urie Bronfenbrenner and others

Role is now filled by Universities and many research organizations (AIR, Mathematica, Child Trends, RTI, Westat, Urban Inst)

This is a very new role for human development researchers

- Many presentations at HSRC are excellent examples of such scholarship
- As decision-making has devolved to state and regional levels, there is great opportunity to assist states and communities in policy research, evaluation, technical assistance and training to improve the quality of human services



Assumption: Basic Premises

At most levels, policy-makers have the following perceptions of University Research:

- Rarely does it have any Policy-making Value
- It is usually focused on Faculty Self-Interest
- It is usually (always) Late

Basic Premises

- Research findings are rarely presented in ways that are Practically Useful
- University Researchers Usually Cannot be Trusted to answer the question they are asked to consider
- University Researchers Don't Understand the Cycles that drive decision-making (election cycles, budget cycles, new administrations, etc.)

But.....

Remember that We Do Have Knowledge that can influence policy

Process of Partnerships

- The process of making such partnerships to influence change is usually slow and requires multiple contacts across agencies, legislative committees, advocates, etc.
- We have A LOT to learn from Them!
- If we are genuinely interested they will be surprised, will test us, and if we succeed we can be come partners

The Beginning

- Show Up Lots of Places
- Put Aside Your Agenda
- Listen, Don't Talk
- Find Out What Problems Are Important to Others
- Brainstorm with Them on Their Issues/Concerns

Places to Start

- Every State and Community has different configurations
- Power and decision-making vary by state and community
- Agencies of State
 - Welfare/Health
 - Education
 - Bureau of Drug & Alcohol /Commission on Crime/Mental Health
 - Maternal and Child Health
- Legislative Committees meet with Policy Staff
- County and City Government (same places)
- Invite Key People To Meetings at The University
 - Legislators/Key Decision-Makers
 - Policy Office Staff

Process

- Listen Try to Understand "the World" from Their Desk
- Don't Ask for Anything
 - Change Perceptions of the University "Begging Bowl"
- Get Credibility, then be Proactive
 - "A decision is the action an executive must take when he has information so incomplete that the answer does not suggest itself."

Adm. Arthur W. Radford

- Understand the critical role of accountability and outcome research to government
- Circulate, circulate

Political Provisos

- You are there as a scientist to help use good science to make policy
- Try to Be Politically Neutral
- Don't look for credit

Bipartisanship and Change

- As you move up the echelons your political contributions will be monitored
- Look for contacts and support on both sides of the political aisle
- When administrations or parties change, there are often substantial opportunities for new ideas



- How to assist Communities to utilize a Prevention Science/Public Health Model to Inform Decision-Making
- How to promote broad dissemination "Going to scale" with programs
- How to integrate specific EV prevention programs with ongoing activities in schools, families, and communities





- 1998 Began Association with PCCD
 - Seminars on Evidence-Based Programs and their Effects
- 2000 PCCD Began the "Blueprints" Funding Program
- 2004 PSU Became active in shaping the Request for Proposals
- 2006 Research pointed to needed changes in the RFP criteria "What gets Assessed, gets Attention"
 - Fidelity Assessed by Developer as condition for continued funding in Years 3 and 4 poor fidelity = loss of funding Outcome data from Year 2 report necessary for Year 4 funding
- 2008 PSU Two reports on the Program's Effects
- 2008 PSU Evidence-Based Prevention and Intervention Support Center
