# ED-HHS PARTNERSHIP OVERVIEW

PARTNERSHIP ANNOUNCED ON NOVEMBER 23, 2015

## GOALS AND OUTCOMES

- Provide coordinated support to disconnected youth who too often lack access to postsecondary education and skill training opportunities.
- Present learning opportunities and expand awareness of resources that will allow grantees to better meet the needs of our similar populations.
- Collaborate to yield more educational opportunities for youth who are outside the trajectory toward postsecondary education and related pathways.

# OFFICE OF POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION (OPE)

## OVERVIEW

- OPE works to strengthen the capacity of colleges and universities to promote reform, innovation and improvement in postsecondary education, promote and expand access to postsecondary education and increase college completion rates for America's students, and broaden global competencies that drive the economic success and competitiveness of our Nation.
- OPE administers over 60 programs that address critical national needs and support our mission of increasing access to quality postsecondary education



# STUDENT SERVICE

## OVERVIEW

- Student Service is a grant-making division in OPE.
- Student Service administers grant programs aimed at assisting all students in achieving their higher education goals, especially low-income students, first-generation college students, students with disabilities, and other disconnected students.
- In FY 2015 alone, Student Service awarded over \$1 billion to more than 3,000 grants across the United States and the insular areas. More than 1.3 million students will be served through the work of these grantees.

# **GAINING EARLY AWARENESS AND READINESS FOR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMS (GEAR UP)**

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**PRECOLLEGE PROGRAM**

# MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

**Mission:** The GEAR UP program is a discretionary grant program which encourages applicants to provide support and maintain a commitment to eligible low-income students, including students with disabilities, to assist the students in obtaining a secondary school diploma and to prepare for and succeed in postsecondary education.

**Objective 1:** Increase the academic performance and preparation for postsecondary education for GEAR UP students.

**Objective 2:** Increase the rate of high school graduation and participation in postsecondary education for GEAR UP students.

**Objective 3:** Increase the educational expectations for GEAR UP students' and increase student and family knowledge of postsecondary education options, preparation and financing.

# TYPES OF GEAR UP GRANTS

## STATE GRANTS

## PARTNERSHIP GRANTS

GEAR UP provides six or seven-year grants to States and partnerships to provide services at high poverty middle and high schools.

# STATE APPLICANTS

## Required Activities Component

- Provide information regarding financial aid for postsecondary education for participating students
- Encourage student enrollment in rigorous or challenging curricula, in order to reduce the need for remedial coursework at the postsecondary level
- Improve the number of participating students who obtain a secondary school diploma and complete application to enroll in a program of postsecondary education

# STATE APPLICANTS (CONT'D)

## Permissible Activities

- Providing technical assistance to secondary schools that are located within the state or GEAR UP partnerships that are located within the state
- Providing professional development opportunities for individuals working with eligible students
- Providing strategies and activities that align efforts in the state to prepare eligible students to attend and succeed in postsecondary education



# STATE APPLICANTS

## Additional Permissible Activities

- Providing tutors and mentors
- Providing outreach activities to recruit priority students
- Providing supportive services to eligible students
- Providing intensive extended school day, school year or summer programs
- Enabling eligible students to enroll in Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate

# PARTNERSHIP APPLICANTS

## Required Activities

- Provide information regarding financial aid for postsecondary education for participating students.
- Encourage student enrollment in rigorous or challenging curricula, in order to reduce the need for remedial coursework at the postsecondary level.

# PROGRAM GOALS

**Goals:** The goals of TS are to increase the number of youth from disadvantaged backgrounds who complete secondary school, enroll in, and complete a program of a postsecondary institution.

# ELIGIBLE PARTICIPANT

- U.S. citizens
- Permanent residents of the U.S., Guam, Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, Micronesia or Marshall Islands.
- Anyone who has completed 5 years of elementary education, or is between the ages of 11 and 27.
- Those older than 27 can be served - if there is no Education Opportunity Center in the target area.
- A veteran, regardless of age, can be served.
- 2/3 of all participants served must be both:
  - Low-income; and
  - Potential first-generation college student.



# REQUIRED SERVICES

- Connections for participants to high quality academic tutoring services to enable the participants to complete secondary or postsecondary courses.
- Advice and assistance in secondary school course selection and, if applicable, initial postsecondary course selection.
- Assistance in preparing for college entrance examinations and completing college admissions applications.

# REQUIRED SERVICES

Guidance on and assistance in:

- secondary school re-entry;
- alternative secondary education programs for secondary school dropouts that lead to the receipt of a regular secondary school diploma;
- entry into general education development (GED) programs; or
- entry into postsecondary education.



# REQUIRED SERVICES

- Information on the full range of Federal student financial aid programs and benefits (including Federal Pell Grant awards and loan forgiveness) and on resources for locating public and private scholarships.
- Assistance in completing financial aid applications, including the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).



# REQUIRED SERVICES

Connections for participants to education or counseling services designed to improve the financial and economic literacy of the participants or the participants' parents, including financial planning for postsecondary education.

# PERMISSIBLE SERVICES

- Academic tutoring, which may include instruction in reading, writing, study skills, mathematics, science and other subjects.
- Personal and career counseling or activities.
- Information and activities designed to acquaint youth with the range of career options available to youth.
- Exposure to the campuses of institutions of higher education, as well as to cultural events, academic programs, and other sites or activities not usually available to disadvantaged youth.



# PERMISSIBLE SERVICES

Programs and activities as described in this section that are specifically designed for participants:

- who are limited English proficient
- from groups that are traditionally underrepresented in postsecondary education
- who are individuals with disabilities
- who are homeless children or youth
- who are foster care youth
- who are other disconnected participants

# PERMISSIBLE SERVICES

- Workshops and counseling for families of participants served.
- Mentoring programs involving elementary or secondary school teachers or counselors, faculty members at institutions of higher education, students, or any combination of these persons.

# ELIGIBLE APPLICANT

- Institutions of higher education;
- Public and private agencies or organizations, including community-based organizations with experience in serving disadvantaged youth;
- Secondary schools; and
- A combination of institutions, agencies, organizations and secondary schools.

# WHAT IS THE UPWARD BOUND PROGRAM?

A program that provides Federal grants to projects designed to generate in program participants the skills and motivation necessary to complete a program of secondary education and to enter and succeed in a program of postsecondary education.



# WHAT IS THE UPWARD BOUND MATH SCIENCE PROGRAM?

A program that provides Federal grants to projects designed to generate in program participants the skills and motivation necessary to complete a program of secondary education and to enter and succeed in a program of postsecondary education in programs that lead to careers in math and science.



# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE?

- U.S. citizen or national of the United States.
- A permanent resident of the United States.
- Is in the United States for other than a temporary purpose and provides evidence from the Immigration and the Naturalization Service of his or her intent to become a permanent resident.
- A permanent resident of Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, or the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands.
- A resident of the Freely Associated States-the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, or the Republic of Palau.



# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE? (CONT'D)

- The Individual is:
  - A potential first generation college student;
  - A low-income individual; or
  - An individual who has a high risk for academic failure.
- Has a need for academic support.
- Has completed the eighth grade and is at least 13 years old but not older than 19.



# UB AND UBMS SERVICES

## Required Services:

- Academic tutoring
- Advice and assistance in secondary and post secondary course selection
- Preparation for college entrance exams and completion of college admission applications
- Information on federal student financial aid programs:
  - Federal Pell grant awards
  - Loan forgiveness
  - Scholarships
- Assistance completing financial aid applications
  - Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)



# UB AND UBMS SERVICES (CONT'D)

Guidance on and Assistance in:

- Secondary school reentry
- Alternative education programs for secondary school dropouts that lead to the receipt of a regular secondary school diploma
- Entry into general educational development (GED) programs, or
- Entry into postsecondary education
- Services designed to improve the financial and economic literacy of students or the students' parents, including financial planning for postsecondary education



# UB AND UBMS PERMISSIBLE SERVICES

## Permissible Program Services:

- Exposure to cultural events and academic programs
- Career option activities
- On-campus residential programs
- Mentoring programs
- Work study
- Activities designed for limited English proficient participants, participants with disabilities, homeless, foster care, disconnected participants



# UB AND UBMS STRUCTURE

## *Academic Year (Required)*

- Provide weekly instructional and enrichment activities

## *Summer Component (Required)*

- 6 weeks in length
- Provide instructional and enrichment activities at least 5 days per week
- Residential (encouraged but not required)



# UPWARD BOUND BRIDGE COMPONENT

(OPTIONAL)

Transitional phase in which high school Upward Bound graduates may take college level courses to transition into postsecondary education.



# UB MATH AND SCIENCE REQUIRED SERVICES

- Intensive instruction in mathematics and science, including hands-on experience in laboratories, in computer facilities and at field sites
- Activities that will provide participants with opportunities to learn from mathematicians and scientists who are engaged in research and teaching at the applicant institution, or who are engaged in research or applied science at hospitals, governmental laboratories, or other public and private agencies
- Activities that pair participants with math and science graduate students or math science undergraduate majors who serve as tutors or counselors

# VETERANS UPWARD BOUND PROGRAM

## *Purpose:*

To motivate and assist veterans in the development of academic and other requisite skills necessary for acceptance and success in a program of postsecondary education.

The program provides assessment and enhancement of basic skills through counseling, mentoring, tutoring and academic instruction in the core subject areas.



# VUB PERMISSIBLE SERVICES

- Instruction in mathematics, laboratory science, foreign language, composition, and literature;
- Intensive basic skills development in academic subjects required for the successful completion of a high school equivalency program and for admission to postsecondary programs;
- Short-term remedial or refresher courses for veterans who have graduated from high school but delayed pursuing postsecondary education;
- Special services, including mathematics and science preparation, to enable veterans to make the transition to postsecondary education;
- Assistance in securing support services from other available resources such as the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, state veterans agencies, and other associations or agencies that serve veterans;



# VUB PERMISSIBLE SERVICES CONT'D

- Assistance in postsecondary course selection;
- Assistance in preparing for college entrance examinations;
- Assistance in completing college admission applications;
- Information on the full range of Federal student financial aid programs and resources for locating public and private scholarships;
- Assistance in completing financial aid applications;
- Guidance and assistance in alternative education programs, entry into general educational development programs or postsecondary education; and
- Education or counseling services designed to improve the financial and economic literacy of students.

# WHAT IS THE EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY CENTERS (EOC) PROGRAM?

For programs that:

- Provide information regarding financial assistance to individuals who want to pursue a program of postsecondary education
- Provide assistance to individuals applying for admission to institutions that offer programs of postsecondary education
- Improve the financial and economic literacy of participants



# PROGRAM GOALS §644.1

- To provide information regarding financial and academic assistance available to individuals who desire to pursue a program of postsecondary education
- To provide assistance to individuals in applying for admission to institutions that offer programs of postsecondary education, including assistance in preparing necessary applications for use by admissions and financial aid officers
- To improve the financial and economic literacy of participants on topics such as:
  - Basic household income, household money management, and financial planning skills
  - Basic economic decision-making skills



# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE A GRANT?

## §644.2

- An institution of higher education
- A public or private agency or organization, including a community-based organization *with experience in serving disadvantaged youth*
- A combination of the types of institutions, agencies, or organizations (consortium)
- A secondary school

# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE IN A PROJECT? §644.3

- U.S. Citizens
- Permanent residents of U.S., Guam, Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, Micronesia, or Marshall Islands
- Individuals who are at least 19 years of age, or those less than 19 years of age if there is no Talent Search project in the target area
- Any veteran, regardless of age



# WHAT SERVICES MAY A PROJECT PROVIDE? §644.4

- Public information campaigns designed to inform the community about opportunities for postsecondary education and training
- Academic advice and assistance in course selection;
- Assistance in completing college admission and financial aid applications
- Assistance in preparing for college entrance examinations
- Education or counseling services designed to improve the financial and economic literacy of participants



# WHAT SERVICES MAY A PROJECT PROVIDE? (CONT'D)

- Guidance on secondary school reentry or entry to a General Educational (GED) program or other alternative education program for secondary school dropouts
- Individualized personal, career and academic counseling
- Tutorial services
- Career workshops and counseling
- Mentoring programs involving elementary or secondary school teachers, faculty members at institutions of higher education, students, or any combination of these persons



# WHAT SERVICES MAY A PROJECT PROVIDE? (CONT'D)

Activities designed for participants:

- with limited English proficiency;
- from groups that are traditionally underrepresented in postsecondary education;
- who are individuals with disabilities;
- who are homeless children and youth;
- who are foster care youth;
- other disconnected participants;

Other activities designed to meet the purposes of the Educational Opportunity Centers program.

# WHAT IS THE STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES PROGRAM? (§646.1)

SSS provides grants to:

- Increase retention and graduation rates of eligible students;
- Increase the transfer rate of eligible students from two-year to four-year institutions;
- Support the success of students who are limited English proficient, traditionally underrepresented in postsecondary education, individuals with disabilities, and homeless children and youth, foster care youth, or other disconnected students; and
- Improve financial and economic literacy of students.



# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE A GRANT? (§646.2)

SSS grantees must be:

- An institution of higher education;

OR

- A combination of institutions of higher education.



# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE? (§646.3)

**A student who meets all of the following criteria:**

- Is a citizen or national of the United States or meets the residency requirements for Federal student financial assistance;
- Is enrolled or accepted for enrollment in the next academic term at the grantee institution;
- Has a need for academic support; and
- Is a low-income individual, a first-generation college student, or an individual with disabilities.



# WHAT SERVICES/ACTIVITIES ARE PROVIDED? (§646.4)

## Required Services:

- Academic tutoring;
- Advice and assistance in course selection;
- Information on Federal financial aid programs as well as scholarships;
- Assistance in completing the FAFSA;
- Education or counseling services to improve financial and economic literacy.

# WHAT IS THE CCAMPIS PROGRAM?

The CCAMPIS program's purpose is:

- to support the participation of low-income student-parents in postsecondary education through the provision of campus-based child care services;
- to assist the institutions in providing campus-based child care services to low-income students;
- to publicize the availability of student financial assistance;
- to encourage persons to enter or reenter secondary or postsecondary education programs and complete those programs.

# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE A GRANT?

CCAMPIS grantees must be:

- An institution of higher education is eligible to receive a grant under this program if the total amount of all Federal Pell grant funds awarded to students enrolled at the institution of higher education for the preceding fiscal year equals or exceeds \$350,000.

# WHAT SERVICES/ACTIVITIES ARE PROVIDED?

- Support or establish campus-based child care programs primarily serving the needs of low-income students enrolled at the institution;
- Establishing or expanding child-care programs for infants and toddlers as well as providing before- and after-school services for older children;
- Subsidizing the costs of the child-care services for low-income students;
- Grants may be used for before- and after-school services;
- Grants may be used to serve the child care needs of the community served by the institution.

# **RONALD E. MCNAIR POST BACCALAUREATE ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAM**

# WHAT IS THE MCNAIR PROGRAM (§647.1)?

The Ronald E. McNair the McNair program awards grants to institutions of higher education for projects designed to provide disadvantaged college students with effective preparation for doctoral study.

# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE A GRANT? (§647.2)

McNair grantees must be:

- An institution of higher education;

OR

- A combination of institutions of higher education.

# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE?

## (§647.3)

**A student who meets all of the following criteria:**

**(A)**

- A U.S. citizen or national of the United States; or
- A permanent resident of the United States; or
- In the United States for other than a temporary purpose and must provide evidence from the Immigration and the Naturalization Service of his or her intent to become a permanent resident; or
- A permanent resident of Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, or the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands; or
- A resident of the Freely Associated States-the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, or the Republic of Palau.



# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE (CONT.)? (§647.3)

## (B)

- Enrolled in a degree program at an Institution of Higher Education (IHE)

## (C)

- A low-income individual who is a first-generation college student; or
- A member of a group that is underrepresented in graduate education; or
- A member of a group that is underrepresented in certain academic disciplines as documented by standard statistical references or other national survey data submitted to and accepted by the Secretary on a case-by-case basis.

## (D)

- Not enrolled in doctoral level study at an institution of higher education.



# WHAT SERVICES/ACTIVITIES ARE PROVIDED? (§647.4)

## Required Services:

- Opportunities for research and other scholarly activities;
- Summer internships;
- Seminars to prepare students for doctoral study;
- Tutoring;
- Academic counseling;
- Assistance in securing admission and financial assistance for enrollment in graduate programs.

# GRADUATE ASSISTANCE IN AREAS OF NATIONAL NEED (GAANN) PROGRAM

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GRADUATE PROGRAM

# WHAT IS THE GAANN PROGRAM (§648.1)?

The GAANN program provides fellowships through academic departments of institutions of higher education to assist graduate students of superior ability who demonstrate financial need and plan to pursue the highest possible degree available at their institution in a designated area of national need.

# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE A GRANT? (§648.2)

- Any academic department of an institution of higher education that provides a course of study that—
  - (i) Leads to a graduate degree in an area of national need; and
  - (ii) Has been in existence for at least four years at the time of an application for a grant under this part.
- (2) An academic department of an institution of higher education that—
  - (i) Satisfies the requirements of paragraph (a)(1) of this section; and
  - (ii) Submits a joint application with one or more eligible non-degree-granting institutions that have formal arrangements for the support of doctoral dissertation research with one or more degree-granting institutions.



# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE A GRANT (cont.)? (§648.2)

- (b) A formal arrangement under paragraph (a)(2)(ii) of this section is a written agreement between a degree-granting institution and an eligible non-degree-granting institution whereby the degree-granting institution accepts students from the eligible non-degree-granting institution as doctoral degree candidates with the intention of awarding these students doctorates in an area of national need.
- (c) The Secretary does not award a grant under this part for study at a school or department of divinity.
- A combination of institutions of higher education.

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






