



Footnotes

- A large portion of the program's caseload are referrals from the State of Washington, therefore the majority of collections are forwarded to the State of Washington.
- Puyallup Tribe Child Support Program establishes paternity on all children needing paternity established.
- The majority of past due support owed is debt established in a foreign order by and for the State of Washington cases referred to the Puyallup Tribe Child Support Program for enforcement.

Tribal Special Points of Interest

The Puyallup Tribe has operated the first federally funded tribal child support program in Washington State; since 2001. We provide services to assist children in receiving this support in a respectful and supportive manner that:

- Protects the sacred citizens of our community, the children
- Encourages and empowers families
- Attains the highest standards in providing child support services, and
- Exercises and protects the sovereignty of the Puyallup Tribe

Tribal Narrative

Paternity Establishment:

The program established paternity on 95% of the children needing paternity established. The remaining cases were in the judicial process of establishing a paternity order.

Establishing Child Support:

During the year, our program set some child support orders at the minimum monthly amount due to an increase in unemployment resulting from the current economic struggle affecting our caseload.

Collections of Child Support:

Our program collected a total of \$517,909, of which 63% (or \$395,197) represented current support owed. The remainder of \$122,712 applied to arrears debt, which is primarily associated with referred enforcement orders established by the State of Washington Division of Child Support. Our program collected child support from 64% of the Non Custodial Parents with a financial obligation. The program collected child support, approximately 83% of collections were received from employer payments through Wage Withholding, 15% from client payments and just under 2% from other jurisdictions.

Outreach Work:

Outreach work requires time, patience and diligence with some clients requiring more than one visit and where others need extensive field work to locate them, we had:

- 86% success rate in locating clients
- 100% success rate in serving legal documents for due process
- 100% success rate in obtaining DNA samples for paternity establishment cases
- 73% success rate in obtaining Agreed Orders with the remaining 27% utilized the Tribal Court for full judicial process in establishing a Child Support order.


This work has avoided cases going forward to show cause and possible contempt through Tribal Court and additional judicial processes.







Figure T-1. Grand Total Collections

STANDING ROCK SIOUX (cont.)

Tribal Special Points of Interest

The Standing Rock Sioux Reservation was originally established as part of the Great Sioux Reservation. Article 2 of the Treaty of Fort Laramie of April 29, 1868 set up the boundaries of the Great Sioux Reservation to that of all present day South Dakota west of the Missouri River. The Standing Rock Agency was established just north of the reservation border at Fort Yates in 1873 in present day North Dakota. Therefore, the northern border of the Great Sioux Reservation was extended to the Cannon Ball River by Executive Order in 1875. The Great Sioux War of 1876-1877 was fought against the United States for continued control of the Black Hills. The Great Sioux Nation's eventual defeat led to the Congressional Act of March 2, 1889 which broke up the Great Sioux Reservation into six separate reservations including the current Standing Rock Sioux Reservation.

The Standing Rock Sioux Tribe is governed by the Standing Rock Tribal Council. The Tribal Council consists of a Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, one representative from each of the eight districts, and six representatives elected At-Large by all enrolled members residing on the reservation. The Chairman of the Tribal Council provides leadership and is the Chief Administrator for all tribal programs.

Today, the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe lies on the border between North and South Dakota within the counties of Sioux and Corson respectively. The current number of enrolled members is estimated at 17,000. The current population of the reservation is estimated at 13,000 with 9,000 of those residence being enrolled members of the tribe.


The reservation still suffers from a staggering unemployment rate of 53.9%. The Tribal Government is the largest employer followed closely by tribal entities Prairie Knight Casino and Grand River Casino, as well as Sitting Bull College. Unlike the national average, the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe still has a high rate of teen pregnancies and unplanned pregnancies resulting in a high number of non-traditional families.

Standing Rock's Tribal IV-D Program was created to fill the need for IV-D services on the reservation. The tribe's IV-D program became comprehensive in January of 2013.



The Port Madison Indian Reservation is home to the Suquamish People. Located along the Puget Sound in Western Washington, it is an ancient place on Agate Passage, the site of Old-Man-House Village, home to Chief Seattle and the heart of the Suquamish People.

Tribal Narrative

Child support Enforcement 2013 Program Overview

The Suquamish Tribe Child Support Enforcement Program provides the following performance targets based on the Suquamish Tribal Council's adoption of measurable goals to provide for the care of their children, which began comprehensive status on January 7, 2011.

Support Order Establishment

In FFY 2013, 157 cases had an existing order for child support attached to their referrals from other jurisdictions. Of the six remaining cases received, child support orders were established within 90 days on 100% of the cases.

Amount of Current Child Support Collected


Current support was collected on 17% of cases prior to the Suquamish Child Support Enforcement Office (SCSEO) receiving those cases. Once SCSEO received and opened a child support case, current child support collected increased to 40%. An increase of 57% for FFY 2013.

Amount of Past Due Child Support Enforcement

SCSEO increased the number of cases receiving a payment on child support arrearages by 53% from the level prior to those cases being referred to Suquamish Child Support Enforcement Office for collection actions.

Cross-Jurisdictional Benefits


In addition to the performance goals set by our tribal council, SCSEO collected and distributed \$192,301.00 to other jurisdictions, which is above the \$63,965.00 collected and distributed directly to custodial parents by the Suquamish Child Support Enforcement Office in the federal fiscal year 2013.



Tribal Special Points of Interest

History

The people of the Cayuse, Umatilla and Walla Walla Tribes once had a homeland of 6.4 million acres in what is now northeastern Oregon and southeastern Washington. In 1855, the Tribes and the United States Government negotiated a [Treaty](#) in which the Tribes “ceded,” or surrendered possession of, much of the 6.4 million acres in exchange for a Reservation homeland of 500,000 acres.

As a result of surveying and federal legislation in the late 1800s that reduced its size, the Umatilla Reservation today consists of 172,000 acres (158,000 acres just east of Pendleton, Oregon plus 14,000 acres in the McKay, Johnson, and McCoy Creek areas southeast of Pilot Rock, Oregon).

In the 1855 Treaty, our ancestors not only reserved land for our people to call home, but they reserved specific rights in the Treaty, which include the right to fish at “usual and accustomed” sites, and to hunt and gather traditional foods and medicines on public lands within the ceded areas. These rights are generally referred to as “treaty reserved rights.”

Our Tribal government works to protect the Treaty rights as well as the Treaty resources that lie within our 6.4 million acre ceded area.




Tribal Narrative

- CTUIR OCSE collects, distributes and disperses child support for tribal members and tribal employees that would otherwise remain uncollectable or significantly delayed. In 2013, 76% of child support collected was from referred cases.
- Our program is an entirely judicial process where parties are encouraged to participate and be heard in Umatilla Tribal Court. We endeavor to establish stipulated orders that give families a sense of control and purpose in child support matters. In 2013, we increased cases we established by 67%.
- OCSE offers obligors opportunities to accept service of legal documents at our office and offers voluntary payroll deductions.
- OCSE works with tribal employers/entities to gather New Hire data to streamline collections for families.
- OCSE works with tribal departments to strengthen families, including collaborating with TERO to identify off-reservation workers.
- CTUIR Board of Trustees (BOT) prioritized exercising civil jurisdiction by enacting the Family Law Code in 2007. In 2008, CTUIR OCSE became a comprehensive IV-D program. Since then, our program’s collections have multiplied eleven times.
- OCSE is accountable to the tribal community and reports to the BOT, the Law and Order Committee (an advisory committee of the BOT), and the General Council.




