


Figure T-1. Grand Total Collections





Figure T-1. Grand Total Collections

Tribal Narrative

- Currently able to enforce on all of our open IV-D cases! We have had some cases that have had high arrearages since our program has become Comprehensive in 2008 and those arrearages have come down tremendously.
- We continue to work with the State in regards to having read only access to their system. Since we are granted very limited access our relationship with our local counterparts is very important to ensure compliance among both agencies working together according to our MOU and other agreements.
- We are currently the only Tribal IV-D agency in Michigan operating a comprehensive program. There have been several tribes interested in joining and I have reached out to a couple of interested tribes to share my knowledge of the Tribal IV-D program. I continue to promote the program around the State and plan to perform a few educational presentations for the upcoming FY.
- We have a small enough case load that we can provide our customers with one on one attention. We are very successful in working with our local agencies such as DHS and our local county child support office.
- Our court operates a Drug Court which 44% of those clients are our clients as well. Working with the Drug Court Coordinator to combat behavioral issues that many of our clients suffer from has made a tremendous difference in how this affects their relationship with their children. Throughout this past year we have received less phone calls to our office regarding petty matters as well as less frequent visits from both CP/NCP revolving around problems. Without the open communication and collaboration with each other we'd still continue to see these issues on a regular basis.
- As of February 2015, our office is operating with full staff! We hired on a Community Outreach Coordinator which has helped our office better manage our case load and pick up in the areas that were lacking due to being down our third person for much of the past FY.
- Outreach is a very important piece of our program. We advertise with our tribal radio station for certain events as well as sponsor the trivia program during winter months and any other activity that our area draws. We have an ad that appears in our tribal paper. We distribute our applications and brochures to all of our local agencies that we work together with such as DHS and thrift stores and other spots throughout the community. Our office also participates in local area events such as pow- wows and other community sponsored events where we are able to set up an informational booth. Like many of the other tribes, we have our own website where people can view our program details and print off an application for services.
- The KBIC ICWA committee sponsored its second annual Family Fun Day this September which our office actively participated in. The idea is to encourage families to participate in different activities that tribal departments set up as a family and if you didn't participate together then prizes were not awarded. Some of the activities included painting a family tree, scavenger hunt, face painting, board games, and other family oriented games for children of all ages. There was a meal provided as well to promote the importance of supporting children on all levels, not just the financial aspect.
- Our Community Outreach Coordinator has done a tremendous job of implementing different activities for families and our office has received a great deal of positive feedback from the work she has done. One of the most exciting and upcoming events will be a movie in the park that will be co-sponsored by our youth group as well.
- Our number of incarcerated parents remains low with only roughly 1/8 of our caseload being in jail or in prison. This is significantly low and I hope that it remains that way!
- We currently have around 135 cases that we enforce on. We have been rather busy and I hope to see this number increase throughout the FY.
- I plan to team up with the Drug Court to create and implement a Family Court into our program.
- Our program contracted with Greg Kidder to come and install an access system to replace our current excel system of handling cases. We are still working out the bugs but for the most part it is working well for our office.





Figure T-1. Grand Total Collections






Figure T-1. Grand Total Collections





Figure T-1. Grand Total Collections


MENOMINEE (cont.)

Tribal Special Points of Interest

The Menominee Indian Tribe once occupied a land base estimated at 10 million acres now known as Wisconsin, and parts of Michigan and Illinois. The Tribe lost much of its land base during the early 1800's Treaty era. Today, the reservation is situated on 235,523 acres of Tribe's ancestral homelands which contains over 200,000 acres of the richest forests in the nation. The governing body of the Menominee Tribe is a nine-member Tribal Legislature that is elected by enrolled Tribal members. There is a separate, but equal Tribal Judicial Court that consists of a lower court and a supreme court. The Menominee Tribal Court has jurisdiction over all Native Americans within the exterior boundaries of the Menominee Indian Reservation.



Tribal Narrative

Case load and Collections:

- MLB had 1,562 total cases open in the IV-D program. 1,462 cases have court ordered support representing 94% of the case count;
- The total owed on support for open cases was \$3,405,893.15 and of the total \$2,560,315.42 was collected for a 75% collection rate. This came from Per Capita garnishments, payroll garnishments, minor trust payouts, and voluntary payments;
- \$75,592.58 of the \$1,655,333.51 owed in arrears was collected for a 5% collection rate;
- The total collection rate for the year was \$2,635,908.00 which included current basic support plus arrears;
- 13 paternity tests were performed by our program for children needing paternity established.

Community Outreach:

- Sent monthly Band member newspaper articles to 1,983 Head of Household Mille Lacs Band members;
- Attended 4 Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe's community health fairs;
- Attended Minnesota Family Support and Recovery Council annual conference;
- Had an information table set up at the MLB State of The Band Address;
- Had an information table at the Mille Lacs Band Grand Casino spring job fair;
- Had an information table at the TERO spring hiring fair.

Ongoing Efforts:


- Continue to work with our Child Support Attorney to revise Tribal Statutes to maintain consistency within the program and the courts.
- Continue to work with MN DHS to revise work plan.
- Work with Tribal leaders to identify a bigger office space to accommodate the rapid growth of the departments staffing and space needs.
- Continue to research Father's Program opportunities.
- Continue to update Child Support clients with monthly updates in our monthly Band Member newspaper.
- Research an Arrears Management program.
- Continue to work with the State of Minnesota to change wording in legislation to get Tribal cases transferred jurisdictional to our Tribal Courts.
- Increase collections from previous year of current support and arrears.

History


Once occupying the lands that would today be along the California-Oregon border, member of the Modoc Tribe were removed to Indian Territory in 1873 after capture by U.S. Government armed forces following a six-month war. By 1891, just 68 members of the tribe survived. Today, with about 200 members, the tribe is the smallest recognized in Oklahoma.

Economic/Future Growth

The tribe operates Red Cedar Recycling and The Stables, a gaming facility and restaurant in Miami. The reintroduction of a bison herd is part of the tribe's economic development plan.



Muscogee Nation - Past and Present

- The original homeland of the Muscogee People was in Southeastern North America.
- Today the MCN jurisdictional boundaries cover all or parts of eleven counties within the state of Oklahoma.
- There are currently 76,980 enrolled citizens of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation.
- The people of the Muscogee Nation strive to preserve their heritage, cultural values, and language, while addressing scientific and technological advances, changing demographics, dynamic local, state and national level politics, globalization, life-long education, health care, and family structure.

The Muscogee (Creek) Nation Office of Child Support Enforcement strives to:

- Reduce Indian child poverty
- Increase family stability and self-sufficiency
- Work to reestablish parent-child relationships
- Work with other IV-D agencies to provide child support services
- Locate absent parents
- Determine parentage, if necessary
- Establish and modify child support orders
- Collect and distribute child support in an efficient and timely manner
- Reduce court actions through mediation
